


Building Common Ground Survey

How Americans view connecting and collaborating across differences October 2025

About this study

- This survey was conducted by Hattaway
 Communications from Sept. 30 Oct. 8, 2025 to
 better understand how Americans think about
 connecting and collaborating across differences
 and the role that foundations should play.
- 1,000 American adults—nationally representative by age, gender, race/ethnicity, and region—were recruited and completed the surveyed online.
- Respondents answered questions on their aspirations and concerns for America, attitudes towards foundations, attitudes towards work to collaborate across differences, and opinion on the role foundations should play in this work.





Americans desire unity and collaboration

93% believe

people collaborate across differences to work together to solve hard problems

A strong majority agree:

"To make a difference in the world, you need to be able to work with people you disagree with."

More than 75%

remain *optimistic about the future*, despite polarization

Less than 25%

strongly believe the U.S. is hopelessly divided



Peace and unity rise to the top of Americans' hopes for the future

"Think about what you want for the future of America. What is the first thing that comes to mind?"

"For everyone to remember [their] human decency and live in peace." —Woman, 45-54, White, Democrat

"I want everyone to get along and for **politics to stop being so polarizing in our lives**." —Woman, 25-34, White, Independent


"Peace and prosperity for all Americans." —Man, 65-74, White, Republican

"A future with **unity, opportunities, and fairness** for everyone" —Man, 35-44, Black/African-American, Democrat

"Unity, progress, peace, happiness, success, upward mobility" —Woman, 25-34, Asian/Asian-American, Democrat

Support includes:


92% of Democrats

People believe collaboration across differences can solve problems








And 8 in 10 believe foundations should play an important role
